“... We got to travel around the country and see the reality of Africa instead of the traditional views many Americans have. The experience that really touched me was being able to visit [Dr. Yewah’s] village of Bachingou. We actually got to visit two days. The first day was spent visiting the schools, one of which was built by [the Nwagni Project, a non-profit student organization at] Albion College. The kids at these schools were so excited to see us. We brought stickers along to hand out, and the kids stuck them all over their faces. It was so cute... The second day we went to go visit the chief of the village. It was such a great honor to be invited in to a chief’s house like we were. Not many people get to say that they had that opportunity! The chief was very appreciative of what the group of [F.Y.E. students in] 2006 did; he used that as leverage to get two more schools built...
