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Cameroon is a nation on the West African coast, home to 19 million people, over 200 ethnic groups, and richly diverse landscapes. The country is known for its native music and successful national soccer team. Compared to many other African nations, Cameroon enjoys relatively high political and social stability. However, there are still many problems to overcome. The Nwagni Project hopes to make strides in the vital areas of education and clean water access.

Now that we've achieved phase 1 of our mission, we are moving on to a new goal: providing clean, environmentally friendly and sustainable water to the school and the entire village of Batchingou. As it is now, children have to walk several miles to get water. We are also starting up a new pen-pal initiative between the children in Cameroon and the children in the Albion Public Schools system. We were able to take photos and letters from the children in Albion, bring them to the children in Batchingou, and bring letters from Cameroon back to Albion. I have never personally learned anything as much as I did from the letters; it was not only an incredible experience for all of the children, but for us as well. We wish to move away from simply giving to the community of Batchingou, instead focusing on bringing Albion and Batchingou closer together and creating a lasting relationship.
